Ways to Extend the Life of Your System

- Your system should run continuously each night for optimal results and self-cleaning.
- A minimum of six hours per night is required to keep growth from occurring on the bulb.
- The bulbs must never be illuminated out of the water as they will overheat and fail.
- In heavily fished areas, we recommend using conduit or garden hose over the wire, to protect against nicks in the wire.
- Remember: All of our systems have a true HID design, self-cleaning bulbs, and UL approved components as well as Multiple Safety Backups!

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Tips & Tricks for Fishing Your Underwater Fish Light



Observe Fish Activity

Before you start fishing, you need to know what type of fish you will be targeting. This will help you choose the right bait and lures, as well as the rod and reel you will need to bring in the fish. Observe the fish over the course of a few days. Learn what type of predator fish are around, as well as the type of bait fish that circle the light. Observing the bait is crucial to fishing. It tells you what kind of bait or lure you should use.

Get the Right Gear

The “right gear” differs from person to person. After observing the type of fish in your area, you will be able to determine the best gear for you. The main component of your gear should be your rod and reel combo. Assess the size and type of fish in your area to help you choose the right combo for you.

When fishing these lights, you can use either artificial lures or live bait. Many anglers have their preferences, so choose what works best for you! Whichever you choose, be sure to match your bait/lure to the surrounding baitfish.

One of the most important things to keep in mind is that you need to mimic the bait in the light. Your bait or lures need to look as close to the bait running in your light as possible. Simply buying a similar-looking bait does not guarantee you will catch a big fish. You must also mimic the physical activity of the bait fish. You can do this by flicking your rod, or reeling in at a specific speed.

Using Live Bait

If you prefer live bait, simply go to your local bait shop and purchase similar bait fish to those you see circling your light every night! You don't want to buy shrimp if you never see shrimp at your light.

Using Artificial Lures

There are many choices when it comes to artificial lures. Below are our recommended lures to mimic specific types of bait fish.

Recommended Minnow Lures:

There are thousands of minnow lures to choose from. However, our favorites are the Yo-Zuri Twitchbait, Yo-Zuri Crystal 3D Minnow, and the Storm WildEye Swim Shad.



Recommended Shrimp Lures:

DOA Shrimp and Live Target Shrimp: Tied with a loop knot, the 3” DOA and Live Target shrimp lures mimic the movement & appearances of natural shrimp.



Now Lets Get Fishing!

1. Ensure your bait or lure is secure on your line.
2. Aim your cast outside of the fish light.
 - Predator fish do not swim in the center of the light often.
 - Predators hunt for bait fish in the dark rim surrounding the light.
 - Try to aim your cast in that outer rim.
3. After you cast, work your bait to mimic the activity of the surrounding bait fish.
 - Giving a natural presentation of the bait fish will increase the likelihood that you will get a strike from a predator fish!
4. When you get a strike, be sure to not yank too hard, but hard enough to set the hook.
5. Reel it in!
